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IWA aids pooped pedalers

In the near future thirsty cyclists on Sanibel bike paths may be able to quench their thirst at pathside water fountains, partly through the courtesy of IWA.

At the City's request, IWA will donate hook-ups for up to eight water fountains around the island and also provide the water free of charge.

The fountains themselves are expected to be donated by island service clubs and installed by the City.

Soon you may be able to sample Sanibel's finest without leaving your bike and . . . this one's on us.



Dry at last!

The rainy season has finally wrung itself out and it's time again to think about conserving water, so here are two tips.

Number one is tricky but amazingly effective. If you have a single lever tap in your shower or sink, don't turn it on in the middle (warm) setting. Why? Because it wastes water and energy. If you want hot water turn the dial to "HOT" before turning on the water. That will get the hot water to the tap quickly, then you can set the dial to warm. Result: less unused water down the drain. If you want cold water, turn the dial to cold, then turn on the water. Otherwise you'll draw cold water into the tank which you'll have to pay to heat. (If you're cooling your home you will even have to pay for air conditioning to cool the pipes needlessly warmed.)

The second tip is a lot easier to understand. The biggest water thief in your home is a leaking toilet. Check your toilets now for leaks into the tank or the

bowl or pay the consequences in \$\$\$.

One last thing. Remember to turn off your water when leaving your home even for a short time. A busted washing machine or dishwasher hose can fill your house with water in a few hours while costing you up to \$3 an hour (that's about \$800 per week).

IWA offers to take over wastewater management/sewage treatment

The Board of Directors has informed the City of Sanibel that IWA is willing to participate in the planning and operation of a unified water management system for Sanibel and Captiva which would include wastewater management.

Under the proposal IWA would ultimately take on responsibility for wastewater collection, wastewater treatment, disposal and/or re-use as well as potable water treatment and distribution.

According to engineers who have studied the islands' wastewater needs, IWA is the most likely candidate to plan and operate wastewater management. All agree that water treatment and distribution and wastewater management should be involved in a single comprehensive plan. IWA, as an experienced non profit utility with a state charter for both water supply and wastewater operations, may be in the best position to perform this service.

There are dozens of wastewater treatment plants on Sanibel and Captiva. All are privately operated in connection with profit-making operations.

The owner of the largest sewage collection and treatment system has recently agreed to start negotiations, either to sell to the City of Sanibel within a year or to apply for a city franchise. This may be a first step toward public operation of island sanitation services.

If IWA were to take over a unified water management system, the first step would be a comprehensive plan that would encompass potable water, wastewater, rainfall runoff and water re-use for both Sanibel and Captiva. Initial financing for planning only might come from a one-year tax under a so-called "municipal service benefit unit" formed by Lee County with the approval of the City of Sanibel. Subsequent funding sources would be determined in the plan.


"TWAPOH" will be no more
